

Student Code of Conduct

Purpose and Scope

Ashton Central Mosque (ACM) is committed to creating an Islamic study environment for its students and staff that is safe and where everyone is treated with dignity and respect. All students should work hard to achieve their study goals and take responsibility for their learning. ACM aims for all students to have an enjoyable and successful time both inside and outside the Mosque facilities.

The Code of Conduct explains how we expect students to behave whilst on ACM premises in relation to ACM staff, student, visitors or otherwise.

## Expectations

Whilst it is not possible to lay down an exhaustive set of standard, detailed below are general examples which demonstrate the level of conduct ACM expect from students.

- Treat all ACM staff and fellow students, worshipers, visitors or others with respect.
- Practice and promote equality.
- Behave responsibly and safely at all times both on ACM premises and in the local area.
- Switch off mobile phones and other communication devises when you are in a class.
- Take care of ACM equipment, resources, facilities and buildings.
- Be aware and follow of ACM Internet usage policy.
- Attend all classes on time.
- Keep your teachers/tutors informed of any difficulties you may have which affects your lessons, so that they can support you.
- Ensure that all work is your own.
- Dress in a way that doesn't offend others.
- Dispose of litter responsibly by using bins.
- Do not smoke on or immediately outside ACM premises.

## Gross Misconduct

A serious breach of this code of conduct may constitute gross misconduct and could lead to a disciplinary interview being held with the student's parents. The student could also be excluded from study classes without any written warnings having been issues previously.

Examples of what may be deemed to constitute gross misconduct include, but are not limited to the following:

- Bullying.
- Harassment.
- Aggressive and threatening offensive behavior or language.
- Fraud and deceit.
- Cheating and plagiarism.
- Theft.
- Intentional or reckless damage to ACM property or student property.
- Serious misuse of ACM property or equipment.
- A criminal offence.
- Breach of ACM Internet and Wi-FI Policy.
